The students had the opportunity to ask insightful questions, gaining a deeper understanding of the significance of community engagement and cultural preservation.

After the visit, the group continued their adventure up the hill to the Kariong Scout Camp. The camp was designed to promote teamwork, leadership, and personal growth, featuring a series of outdoor activities. In the afternoon, the group explored Summersby Falls, where the boys enjoyed a refreshing swim in the beautiful surroundings.


